Project 440 is a supportive and inclusive community where youth find their way, ignite their creativity, envision their future, and discover the joy of service.

Dear Project 440 Community,

Project 440 has built on its recent growth and continues to reach and serve more young people. Thanks to your support, in 2022-2023, we launched more partnerships, provided new opportunities, and expanded access to arts participation for hundreds of Philadelphia youth.

The **115** students who took part in our free afterschool programs **Doing Good, Instruments for Success,** and the **Youth Advocacy Council** attended **20** Philadelphia high schools and resided in **37** Philadelphia zip codes.

Building on the success of our collaborations with peer organizations, we partnered with the **Washington Musical Pathways Initiative** to provide *Instruments for Success*, our college readiness and career pathways program for their students. Across all our programs, workshops, and partnerships, we served more than **400** youth in 2022-2023.

Many students who participated in the first *Doing Good* and *Instruments for Success* cohorts graduated college in 2023 and have remained in or returned to Philadelphia, where they are contributing to our community as educators, musicians, nonprofit administrators, emerging entrepreneurs, and more.

Project 440 has become an integral part of Philadelphia's music education landscape and has received noteworthy recognition from our peers. In October, we were honored by the **Greater Philadelphia Cultural Alliance** with the inaugural **Next Award** recognizing *forward-thinking programs that bring renewed relevance to the arts community by introducing creative tactics to engage new generations*.

CREATIVE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Project 440 is a community-based creative youth development organization that is responsive and proactive in its ongoing efforts to remove barriers to arts participation. Our top priority is that Philadelphia youth experience Project 440 as a trusted, welcoming, equitable, and inclusive community. Students earn participation stipends upon program completion. Meals are provided and participants receive transportation subsidies for travel to and from programs.

YOUTH ADVOCACY COUNCIL

Fundamental to our work is our belief that all young people should have the opportunity to learn the skills they need to forge new pathways on their journey to personal fulfillment and success—whatever path they choose.



Our free afterschool programs support youth in their growth as individuals and members of their community. Students develop an entrepreneurial mindset, gain leadership and service skills, learn about the college search process and career opportunities, and attain a toolkit of 21st-century skills.

Doing Good participants develop a toolkit of essential skills, including budgeting, project planning, and goal setting. Students work in groups and receive funding of \$500 to apply these skills to the creation and implementation of a service-learning project inspired by music. In the 2022-2023 school year, **55** students created **nine** projects benefiting more than **250** community members throughout Philadelphia. We are proud to highlight these recent Doing Good projects.





Music on Call worked with pre-school-aged children with special needs to introduce them to rhythm and sounds and provided them with instruments, including bucket drums, recorders, and egg shakers.

Muslia engaged elementary school students in music representing different cultures and demonstrated music's ability to forge a pathway of understanding among people of different cultures and experiences.

Sharing our Sound aims to provide greater access to music education. They have established a growing network of peer mentors who collaborate with music teachers to identify students' needs. The mentors provide instruction and make recordings that are available for free and on-demand on their website.

The project implementation stage of *Doing Good* begins with The Guppy Tank. Each group pitches its project idea to a three-person panel who provide their insights and constructive feedback. The 2022-2023 panel included artists, entrepreneurs, and educators.

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Instruments for Success (IFS) is taught by Cigus Vanni, a college admissions expert. The semester-length program covers all aspects of the college search and admissions process, including how to find the right school, financial aid, audition, application, and interview preparation. Each semester, guest speakers share their education and career paths. In 2023, a session on financial literacy facilitated by representatives from Citizens Bank was added.

Youth Advocacy Council (YAC) members build leadership and project management skills and produce *Music in Color*, which elevates the voices of emerging and established musicians of color. Recent programs have featured a panel of Project 440 alumni who discussed the transition from high school to college and a student-led roundtable discussion on the influence of women and minorities in music.

Since 2021, the Manhattan School of Music has awarded one annual four-year, full-tuition scholarship to a Project 440 student. To be considered, students must have completed *Doing Good, Instruments for Success,* or served as a member of the Youth Advocacy Council. Project 440 and the impact of our **Doing Good** and **Youth Advocacy Council**programs were featured in multiple

Project 440 and the youth we serve benefit from our numerous partnerships, including with the **School District of Philadelphia.** We regularly visit Philadelphia schools and connect directly with teachers and the District's Office of Arts and Creative Learning to ensure students know that Project 440 is a welcoming and trusted space where they can connect with their peers, explore their creativity, and impact their community.





Our partnership with **Temple Music Prep** enables us to hold our *Doing Good* and *Instruments for Success* programs in their Temple University Center City Campus facilities. In addition to providing a central location that is easily accessible by public transportation, our students have access to study areas and practice rooms.

Project 440 annually partners with the Mann Center for the Performing Arts, School District of Philadelphia, and The Philadelphia Orchestra on the **All City Orchestra Summer Academy (ACOSA)**. The 3-week program serves Philadelphia students in 6th through 12th grades and provides a growth opportunity, guiding students to work on technical playing skills.

Our Teaching Artists presented introductory workshops on *Doing Good* and *Instruments for Success*. Founder & Vision Advisor Joseph Conyers, also the Music Director of the All City Orchestra led ACOSA in their performance at the Mann on July 21.












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





